1929 Digest of The Game Laws State of Texas

Game Birds and Game Animals

Animals — Deer, elk, antelope, wild sheep, bear and squirrels are game animals.

Birds and Waterfowl — Turkey, ducks, geese, brant, grouse, prairie chickens, pheasants, quail or partridges, wild pigeons, doves snipes, chachalacas, plover and shore birds of all varieties are game birds of this state.

Open Seasons.

Bear—Nov. 16 to Dec. 31.

Deer—(White tail), Nov. 16 to Dec. 31; black tail, east of Pecos river, Nov. 16 to Dec. 31, and west of Pecos river, Nov. 16 to Dec. 30; Bastrop, Hampshire, Roberts, Hutchinson, Callahan, Eastland, Stephens, Palo Pinto and Parker counties are closed (all kinds) until 1934. Only buck deer with pronged horns or better may be killed.

Doves (mourning) — Red River, Bowie, Delta, Hopkins Titus, Franklin, Morris, Cass, Wood, Camp, Upshur, Marion, Harrison, Gregg, Smith, Van Zandt, Panola, Rush, Cherokee, Henderson, Hood Erath, Hamilton, Coryell, Freestone, Anderson, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Nacogdoches, Shelby, Sabine, San Augustine, Angelina Trinity, Madison, Walker, Grimes, Brazos, Burleson, Washington, Lee, Bastrop, Fayette, Austin, Waller, Lavaca, De Witt, Goliad, Victoria, Calhoun, Ft. Bend, Montgomery, San Jacinto, Polk, Tyler, Jasper, Newton, Jefferson, Orange, Hardin, Liberty and Chambers counties, Dec. 1 to Jan. 16.

Ducks (except wood ducks), geese, brant, snipe, gallinules and mudhens—North zone, Oct. 16 to Jan. 31; south zone, Nov. 1 to Jan. 31.

Prairie Chickens—Both zones, Sept. 1 to Sept. 4, except Collingsworth and Wheeler counties which are closed until 1931.

Quails and Mexican Pheasants—Both zones, Dec. 1 to Jan. 16.

Rails (except coot and gallinules)—Both zones, Sept. and Oct.

R. W. Briggs & Co. Move Equipment To T.N.G. Camp

The R. W. Briggs & Co. paving outfit finished the first lap of concrete paving on the Palacios end of Highway No. 58, that stretch from Elder's barn to the city limits, on First St., Saturday night. On Sunday the machinery was moved to Camp Palacios and is now working towards town. Very satisfactory progress is being made and with the continuance of pretty weather, Palacios will soon have a concrete road entering the city from two directions.

Birds—It is unlawful to kill song birds or other non-game birds at any time, provided the following may be killed at any time and in any numbers: sparrows, rice birds, black birds, buzzards, crows, owls, hawks, woodpeckers, roadrunners, jaybirds, sapsuckers and pelicans.

It is unlawful to hunt migratory birds between sunset and one-half hour before sunrise, and other game between one-half hour before sunrise.

It is unlawful to hunt, kill or possess game birds, game animals or other birds and animals, except where provided by law.

It is unlawful to hunt from a motor boat, sail boat, boat under tow, auto or airplane.

It is unlawful to hunt in state game preserves.

It is unlawful to hunt deer with dogs except in Grimes, Harris, Brazoria, Ft. Bend, Matagorda, Lavaca and Orange counties. One dog may be used in any county to pursue a wounded deer.

It is unlawful to hunt, kill or take any duck, goose or brant by any means other than by the ordinary gun, not to exceed 10 gauge, capable of being shot from the shoulder.

It is unlawful to hunt for hire, or hire anyone to hunt.

It is unlawful to use or possess a headlight at night in a territory where deer are known to range, or hunt with one at any time.

It is unlawful to use a deer call, except deer horns, which may be settled

CLEVELAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Lieut. Ivan M. Palmer Friday won the 80-mile race for the Gen. Mason M. Patrick trophy offered annually to the 3d army attack group from Fort Crockett, Texas, with an average speed of 140.2 miles an hour. He lapped several competitors, thereby causing a mixup through which three other pilots were placed ahead of him in the first official announcement of the result. Lieut. George F. Kinsie was second with a speed of 138.84 and Lieut. Francis M. Ziegler third with 136.14. It was the fastest race of the week.—Houston Post-Dispatch.

FOUR NIMRODS AND SCRIBE GET 200 FISH AT CARANCAHUA BAY

Chalk up another successful fishing trip, and a few more fish stories.

The fish are there, and so is the mud. It was at Carancahua Beach club on Carancahua Bay, some 15 miles below Palacios that five nimrods from Houston caught no less than 200 speckled trout last Sunday in the course of three hours.

Those in the party were Frank M. Hardcastle and Albert J. Buford, both of the Texas Lamp and Oil Company; Bertram C. Burchfield of W. G. Burchfield & Bro.; W. C. Branum, manager of Carancahua Club, and Low W. Duddleston, Post-Dispatch real estate editor.

Until convinced otherwise, let it be maintained that to our knowledge Carancahua bay is the finest fishing waters on the map. At the present the club is difficult to get to during inclement weather, but the roads are fairly good in clear weather.

Of course the party which went down last Saturday night had the luck to strike the trail after a two-inch rain and the old black waxy did its stuff. Both cars being used finally wound up in a ditch along a newly graded road, so the leaders of the party tied a couple of corks on a string and strung them to the cars so we would know where they were when we came back for them, and borrowed a 14-foot boat to proceed on to the club.

In the wee hours of the morning we arrived after shearing two pins as the propeller struck a shell reef. Daylight and a splendid breakfast put us on our way.

Captain Laughter knows his fishing grounds.

Out across the bay on a four-mile stretch he took us in one of the club's launches. Within 20 minutes we had hauled in over 200 pounds of shrimp to be used as bait.

Back to the point where Carancahua bay empties into Matagorda Bay he took us after making the shrimp catch. Burchfield and the writer took to a skiff about 200 yards off one of the points at the compass, equipped with

Two Palacios Fishermen Land 15-ft. Sawfish

While H. M. Barrett and L. H. Jackson of this city were fishing in shallow water just across the bay from the Palacios Pavilion, last Saturday, they caught a monster saw-fish, 15-feet long and weighing nearly 1000 pounds, its saw being 33 inches in length. Another not quite so large was caught at the same time.

There were 14 of the fish in one school and since they seldom frequent shallow water, Barrett and Jackson mistook them for redfish. "They were making beautiful mud stirrs and we thought surely they were redfish," said Barrett.

The monsters ruined a new \$150 net for the fishermen and almost capsized their boat. It required nearly five hours for them to land the two fish, which had become entangled in the net.

The fish were brought to Palacios and put on exhibition at the Green Lantern Cafe Sunday and Monday, and then taken to Victoria and other towns in this section to be exhibited.

Barrett and Jackson also reported sighting an 18-foot shark in the shallow waters of Palacios Bay at the time they were battling with the sawfish. They believe a disturbance in the gulf drove the fish into the bay.

Advertising for Bids On Palacios- El Campo Hiway

More good news for Palacios is the advertising this week for the contract for grading and drainage structures of a section of Highway No. 71, to be let at the meeting of the State Highway commission in Austin, on Sept. 17-18. This section is from the underpass at the Brownsville R. R. on No. 58, north to the Wharton County line, a distance of a little over nine miles. The contract on Highway 71 from El Campo to the Matagorda County line was let some weeks ago and work has begun on it. The contract to be let on the 17th will be the connecting link of hard surface road from Palacios to Highway No. 12 and will give us an all-weather road to most any section in the state. Work on this end of Highway 71 is looked forward to with much interest and as there are no big bridges to be constructed it will probably be the first one to be completed.

PLENTY OF FISH CAUGHT

Many Children Born in County Not Registered

ONLY 68% OF CHILDREN WERE REGISTERED WITH STATE HEALTH DEPT.

According to figures compiled from data secured by the scholastic census enumerators and checked with the birth certificates on file with the State Health Department only about 68% of the children born in Matagorda County during 1928 were registered by the physician or midwife in attendance. 76% of the whites were registered, 41% of the negroes, and 40% of the Mexicans. Many of the children born in Matagorda County during 1928 were deprived of the protection of a legal record of their age, parentage and citizenship.

This failure is also causing the veterans of the World War and their widows a considerable amount of trouble and expense in filing claims for compensation with the Veteran's Bureau.

A concerted drive is being made at this time, in an effort to improve registration in Texas so that it may be admitted to the Federal Registration Area during 1929. If this is to be done the combined efforts of all civic agencies and local officials is necessary. Only two other states are outside of the Area at this time. 90% efficiency is required for admission.

Texas poultry shipments to major markets in 1928 totaled 27,000,000 pounds, putting the state in fifth place in poultry shipment.

To help citizens keep their lawns and trees green and beautiful the City of Sherman puts into effect a summer water rate of less than half the regular rate for excess water used in that purpose.

The stock subscriptions for the cheese factory at Georgetown have practically been completed, and it is expected the plant will be in operation this summer, according to the Williamson County Sun.

Clarendon is seriously considering adoption of a city plan, and a survey from a topographic and traffic viewpoint is to be made soon. Texas cities are falling in line in the effort to plan seriously for future conditions.

Texas was well down in the list in the "ton litter" contest in which 30 states took part, but the heaviest single litter ever produced in the contests was one raised in Texas whose eight pigs averaged 390 pounds each at the end of the 180-day period allowed.

The dates for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention have been set for Oct. 24-26 at El Paso, postponement from the usual time being due to the expected visit of President Hoover to Texas at that time. An even larger attendance than usual is expected, and the organization's annual conventions have drawn tremendous crowds for these many years.

Urging Texans to take their summer vacations in Texas, the Dallas Journal says he would "return to his home base a better informed and more contented citizen than he has been. . . . In many sections of the state there are evidences of improvement and prosperity that would make an optimist and enthusiast of any Texan who has a close-up look at them for the first time." And while most of us are accustomed to taking our vacations in the summer time, a better time to see Texas would be in the early fall or spring, at either of which times Texas has more natural and acquired beauty to the square inch than almost any section of the globe.

"RESOLUTION APPROVING ENGINEER'S STATEMENT OR ROLL OF PROPERTY ABUTTING CARY AVENUE AND HABER AVENUE AND 5TH STREET AND 4TH STREET IN THE CITY OF PALACIOS, NAMES OF OWNERS, ESTIMATED COSTS OF MAKING IMPROVEMENTS ON SAID STREETS AND ESTIMATED AMOUNTS TO BE ASSESSED AGAINST ABUTTING PROPERTY AND OWNERS THEREOF, FIXING THE TIME AND PLACE FOR A HEARING TO BE GIVEN TO OWNERS OF SUCH PROPERTY AND ALL OTHERS INTERESTED THEREIN, AND PROVIDING FOR NOTICES OF SUCH HEARING, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY."

IT APPEARING THAT HERETOFORE ON or about the 23rd day of August, 1929, the City Council of the City of Palacios passed a resolution providing for the improvement of portions of Cary (Main) Avenue and Haber (Commerce) Avenue and 5th Street and 4th Street in the City of Palacios, and providing that a portion of the costs thereof shall be assessed against the property abutting said streets and the owners thereof, the general nature of said improvements so ordered being as follows, to-wit:

- By constructing, reconstructing, repairing and re-aligning curbs, gutters, where adequate curbs and gutters or either of them are not already installed, so as to bring them to proper grade and in proper alignment.
- By filling, grading, excavating and raising, where necessary, and by paving said streets from curb to curb with a concrete pavement.
- By constructing all necessary appurtenances and incidentals to any of said improvements, including drains and culverts.

AND IT FURTHER APPEARING that the City Engineer, E. N. Gustafson, at the request and direction of this Council has prepared and presented to this Council a written statement or roll showing a description of the property which abuts said streets to be so improved, such description showing the names of the respective owners and the lot and block numbers and the estimate of the cost of making such improvements, and also showing the estimate amounts proposed to be assessed against the owners of such abutting property, respectively, and against their property, for such improvements, a copy of which is hereinafter set out:

That a hearing be given before the City Council of the City of Palacios, on the 16th day of September, 1929, at 8 o'clock P. M., in the City Hall of said City, to all owners of property described in the Engineer's statement, and to all lien holders or others interested in said improvements, at which hearing all owners of any of said property or any lien holder or any one having or claiming any right, title or interest therein in any manner, shall have a full and fair opportunity to be heard on the question of benefits to said property by reason of such improvement or about any other question about which they wish to be heard, and they and each of them shall have the right to appear in person or by attorney or agent and make any protest or objection they desire to make about any matter pertaining to such improvement, and such hearing shall be a full and fair hearing and said hearing shall be kept open from day to day until the Council is satisfied that all persons have had a full and fair opportunity to be heard on any matter pertaining thereto, after which said hearing shall be closed, and assessments levied covering the property owner's share of the cost of such improvement.

ESTIMATE OF COST OF PAVING PALACIOS, TEXAS

Cary Avenue from West edge of 5th Street, East across 4th Street, to a point 270 feet East of the East edge of 4th Street, on the left or North side of State Highway 18 ft. pavement, and to a point 120 feet East of the East edge of 4th Street, on the right or South side of the State Highway 18 ft. pavement, total width of finished pavement to be 60 feet between curbs together with full street intersections at crossings of 5th Street and 4th Street.

Haber Avenue from the West edge of 5th Street, East to the East edge of 4th St., the total width of finished pavement to be 58 feet between curbs, together with full street intersections at crossings of 5th St. and 4th St.

Fifth Street from the North edge of Haber Avenue, North to the South edge of Cary Avenue, the total width of finished pavement to be 60 feet between curbs.

Fourth Street from the North edge of Haber Avenue, North to the South edge of Cary Avenue, the total width of finished pavement to be 60 feet between curbs.

The estimate of cost includes the construction of a 6-inch curb along all frontage edge of the proposed pavement and also the installation of Storm Sewers and connections for properly providing for the necessary drainage.

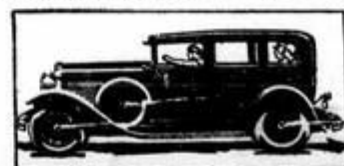
