New York, Aug. 7 .- The New York Times carried a story this week announcing that negotiations are under way for the large scale production of a new "baby" automobile which would be sold through a mail order house for \$200.

The car is the invention of James B. Martin, of the Martin Airplane Factory, Garden City, N. Y., where the models were built.

A feature of the car is that it has no axles in the usual sense of the word, each wheel being independently mounted in the reinforced body. "Aviator cord" is used in the suspension of each wheel instead of a spring.
